**Mary Bundy / Sturgis /Hooper Collection**

**Biographical note:** Mary Buckminster Lothrop Bundy, descendant of William Sturgis & Elizabeth Davis, was the wife of the late McGeorge Bundy, political advisor and President of the Ford Foundation. Mary resides in New York City. She descends from William Sturgis as follows:

In 2007, Mary Bundy donated portraits of William Sturgis' wife, Elizabeth Marsten Davis, and two of his daughters; Ellen (1812-1848) and Caroline (1819-1888) to the Sturgis Library.

In addition to the three portraits, Mary Bundy donated two silhouettes of members of the Sturgis/Lothrop families cut by noted artist August Edouart during his visit to the United States, sometime between 1839 and 1849. The first depicts Mrs. William (Elizabeth Davis) Sturgis; the second is of Eliza L. Lothrop. Eliza later married Charles Homans, and her donations of large tracts of land to the Hancock Trustees of Public Reservations in Maine established a foothold for what would later become Acadia National Park. Homan's Path, built in 1916, was named in her honor.

The three portraits and two silhouettes were restored by Cape Cod Picture Framing in Dennis, MA in 2008, and will be on display at the Sturgis Library along with a photographic portrait of William Sturgis acquired elsewhere.

**Scope and contents note:** The collection consists of books owned by members of the Hooper and Sturgis families, notably Samuel Hooper and Anne Sturgis Hooper. Also included is a sepia photograph of Anne Maria Hooper Lothrop, daughter of Samuel Hooper and Anne Sturgis, and wife of Thornton Kirkland Lothrop. Her grandchildren

and great grandchildren, including Mary Bundy, called her “Gar.” Supporting documents, including biographical and genealogical information, round out the collection.
